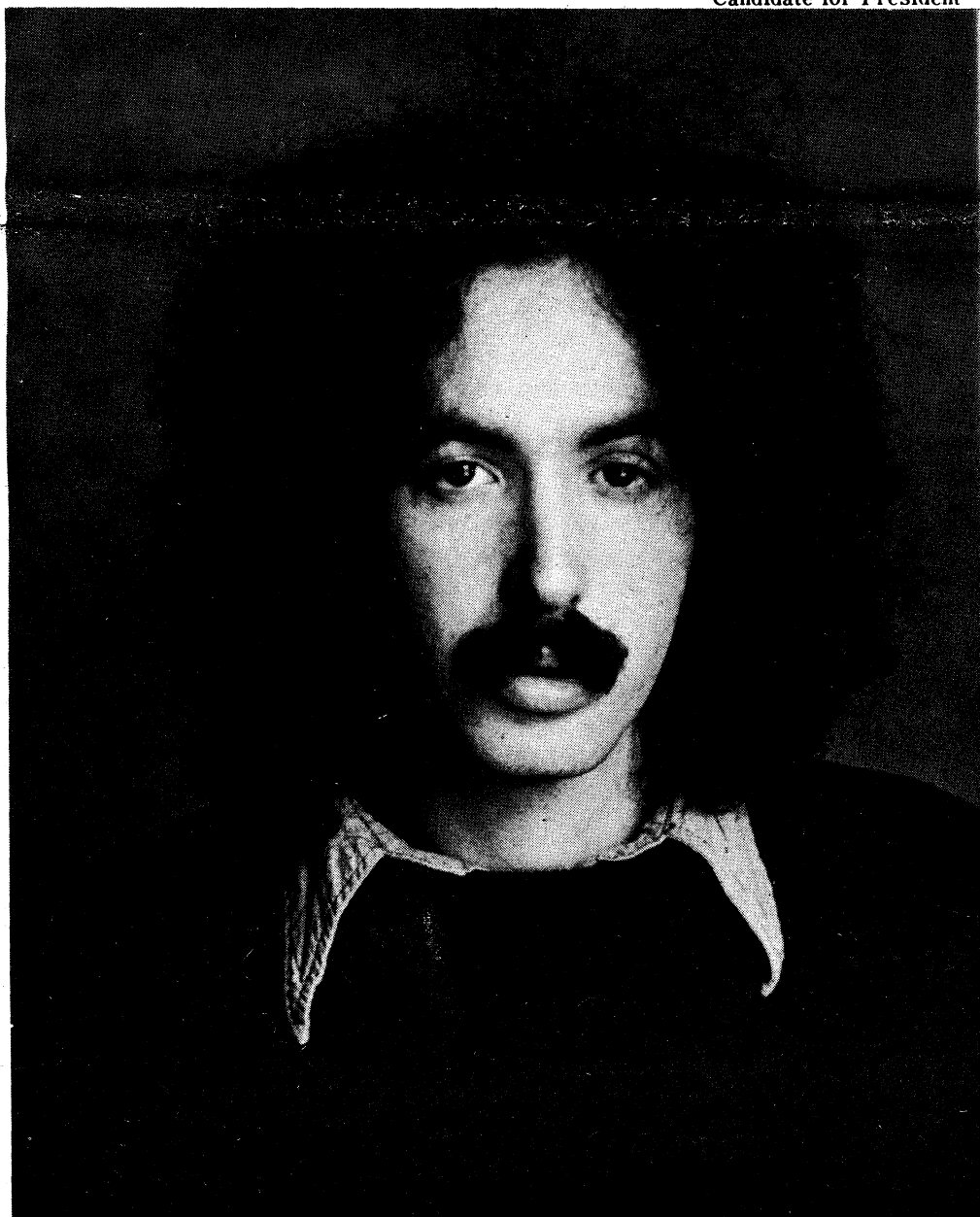

REFORM STUDENT PLATFORM FOR 1975-76

1. Increased Student Services

We believe that students have received little in return for their 45,000 dollars and will therefore increase the services offered to the student community by creating the following:

- Weekly Film Programme
- Major Conferences and Workshops at Glendon involving important national and cultural issues
- Student Exchange Programme with other Universities throughout Canada.
- The establishment of another student centre for cultural activities along with existing facilities on campus.

2. Student Government:

- The establishment of an education committee composed of representatives from the course unions.
- The creation of two new executive posts - Womens Affairs Commissioner and Bilingualism Commissioner.
- The lowering of student executive salaries.

3. Community Affairs:

- The establishment of a recycling depot at Glendon and an environmental group.
- A day-care centre is to be created of the need exists.

5. Bilingualism:

- The establishment of more classes in the two languages - if student demand requires it.
- The institution of bilingualism on all important areas of administration.
- Student Exchange programmes with more major Quebec universities.

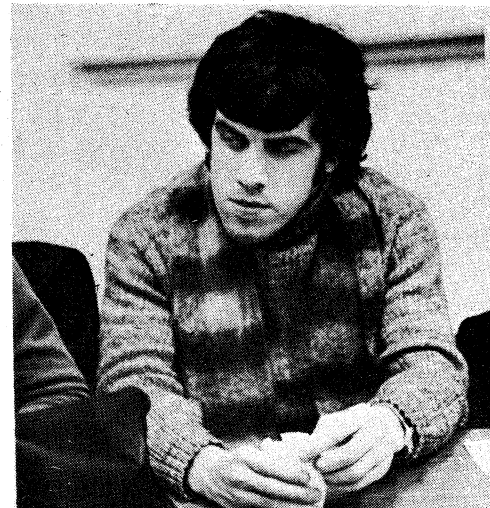

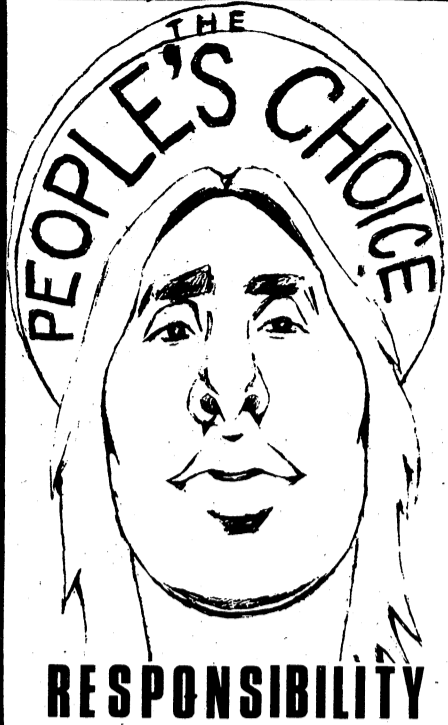


Arthur Roy, ex Glendon student, whose hopes for the Presidency were dashed by C.R.O. ruling. (see inside for details.)

6. Economic Issues:

- Either releasing the Glendon Food contract out for competition with alternate companies or establishing a student-run food service and abolishing the scrip system.
- Lowering the rents in residence to a more equitable position in relation to other residence facilities at York and keeping the administration from applying further increases.
- Lowering the cost of textbooks at Glendon College.
- The creation of a larger assistance fund for needy students.

THE OFFICE OF VICE-PRESIDENT



The office of vice-president deals directly with the president. The vice-president and president must work closely in formulating and executing ideas. It's most important that these two people can work together as a team and for this reason, I have chosen to run on a ticket with Mike Drache. We have set down our basic ideas in a leaflet entitled "Reform Student Platform for 1975-76" but there are a few areas I would like to elaborate on personally.

Cultural and academic activities provided for the student by the Union have been virtually non-existent this year. This year's council has put a lot of work and effort into the promotion of bilingualism, but perhaps at the expense of other matters concerning the students. In order to live more fully in the Glendon community we must be stimulated into participation and enjoyment of services offered. Our film program and especially organized weekend conferences concerning major issues facing Glendon and Canada, i.e. monarchy in Canada, Bilingualism or government cut-backs are good examples of how this could be achieved. Only with your support could these objectives be realized.

Earlier, I mentioned bilingualism. This aspect of our life here is extremely important. The Bennett-Jolicoeur resolutions passed in Faculty Council this year prove the immense interest of student and staff in this issue. Personally, I am not bilingual. I am in the bilingual stream, however, and hope to be able to take a course at Laval in the summer of '76. Because I am not bilingual, I cannot benefit from courses offered in French, but I feel very strongly that if there is a demand for these courses that they be given with no restrictions.

Finally, and, I feel, the most recent issue, is that of government cutbacks in education. I attended the Brock Conference last weekend and what I learned there is as follows:



1) if the government continues its policies on education eventually each student will be paying \$3,000 - \$4,000 tuition or universities will not be able to function.

2) that the government wants to increase the loan portions and decrease the grant portions of O.S.A.P. thereby forcing the student into heavy debt for many years after graduation.

These issues concern every student on every campus. What I would like to do is set up a committee to investigate just how these cutbacks will affect the Glendon community and to inform the student body of all findings in September, but before we can think of this type of action we must be aware of the situation not only here at Glendon, but

across the province as well. This committee would be the liaison between Glendon, O.F.S., and other universities involved in this issue. As I said before, this concerns every student, everywhere, and cannot be ignored.

The issues I have discussed here, briefly are not all the ideas that we have planned; however, they are the most important to me. The only way I can possibly implement them is to become vice-president of the G.C.S.U. and to do that I need your vote next Monday and Tuesday. You will not only be supporting me you will be supporting yourself.

— Je serai intransigeant sur les problèmes à caractère personnel dans les débats, afin de satisfaire aux exigences de la communauté des étudiants.

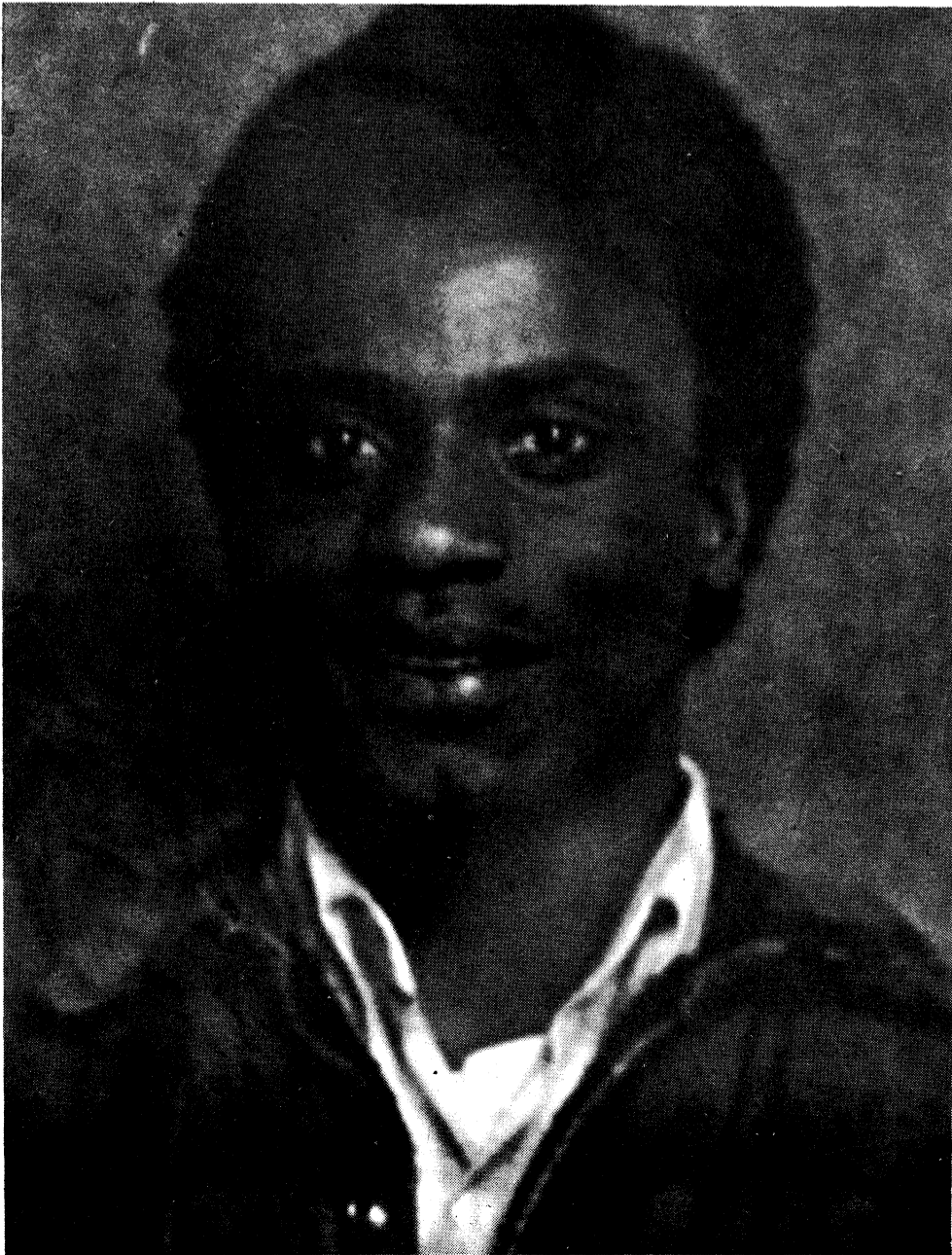

FORTIN WITHDRAWS

I am personally sorry about how things have turned out. I realize that the issue of this election will affect next year's students because, as you know, when somebody is automatically elected by acclamation, he represents the students. An individual was simply nominated and was not challenged...so there he is, a non representative president. I do not want to talk about acclamations as they involve less crucial responsibilities. Nevertheless, what we are facing now is a serious problem. I have discussed the matter with the council and we went over ways of correcting the situation. The constitution needs revision badly. Marc Duguay and others are trying to find a solution to the dilemma. Those who were present at Monday night's council meeting will agree with me when I say that we did all we could. We remained very objective and realistic when facing this matter. Up until Monday morning, we were not aware of how things would turn out. I was running for the office of Commissioner at large but in the light of the issues, I and others have withdrawn. We,

as a whole, did not like the fact that the acclamation process had to be put into effect. The students of this community have the right to elect those who they think will represent the whole student body. We do not want to be represented by someone that we did not elect. I withdrew because I was part of Arthur Roy's team (along with other members of the 74-75 council). Because of some constitutional technicalities, he was rejected as a candidate. I want the students to know that this state of affairs will be challenged as soon as we can get the necessary legal action on the move. We will not let such a situation remain hidden nor will we leave the students without a real president, elected by a majority. The team we formed before our individual resignations still stands. We have proven to be effective on this year's council and we will remain on the platform until the matter is closed. THE STUDENTS JUSTIFY A STUDENT COUNCIL AND WE WANT TO BE SURE THAT IT REMAINS THIS WAY.

AN ARGUMENT AFTER THE FACT

This "article" arrived at the Pro Tem office on Wednesday afternoon. In my opinion, M. Fortin has stepped a long way outside his capacity as External Affairs Commissioner, as an ex-candidate for Commissioner at Large and as a student of this college. He comments on acclamation and claims that it is not a responsible manner in which to fill the office of President (but that acclamations in other offices are acceptable since "they involve less crucial responsibilities"). I find such claims ridiculous and after the fact.

The practice of appointment by acclamation is a recognized method for filling an office when only one person stands for the post. If it was not acceptable to the Glendon Stu-

dent Union that positions be filled this way, then a change should have been implemented a long time ago. To claim now that it is depriving the students of their rights is irresponsible and an indirect charge against Michael Drache, the president-elect. Drache followed all the rules, was not secretive about his candidacy and was quite willing to stand for election. It is most unfortunate that he was unchallenged for the post by a Glendon student. Because he was not, he has every right to that position and the constitution rules clearly in his favour. As far as the non-acceptance of Arthur Roy's nomination, due to "constitutional technicalities", the matter is plain and simple. To open the election to Arthur Roy is to allow any student at the University of Toronto or a student at any

university or anyone for that matter to run for council at Glendon. I doubt we want to be represented in this fashion. Finally, may I address myself to M. Fortin, regarding the last paragraph of his tirade. I assume you are claiming that the council is not prepared to relinquish office to the new council if the president is acclaimed ("...we will remain on the platform until the matter is closed."). If such is the case, I would be more appalled by a group who would resort to such a revolutionary tactic as holding the office illegally, than I would someone who came by that position by acclamation.

If you mean in your closing that the council should be representative of the students, I agree wholeheartedly that it should stay that way. Your solution, M. Fortin would, in no way, achieve that end.

POLITICAL MANOEUVRE

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE GLENDON COMMUNITY

As Chief Returning Officer of the Glendon College Student Union. I must protest the actions of certain members of the present Executive and General Council, which are in contradiction of the present Elections Act. The Act states specifically that one must be a student to run for office, that a student can only run for one office, that no nominations be accepted dated after midnight the day nominations close, and that offices for which there is only one Official Candidate, be acclaimed.

Clearly political manoeuvring by members of the present Council to interfere with a fair election, and actions by members of the Student Union to remove the president-elect from office before he has taken office are deserving of broad protest by the student body.

Any challenges to the actions of the C.R.O. in acclaiming Mike Drache president must be based solely on infractions of the Elections Act. A president-elect cannot be impeached until he/she has taken office.

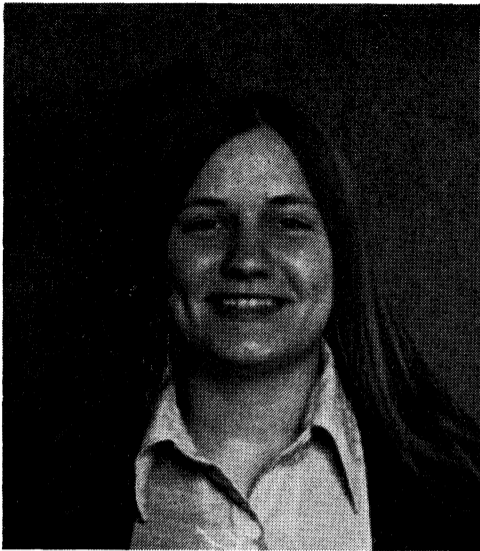

Also:

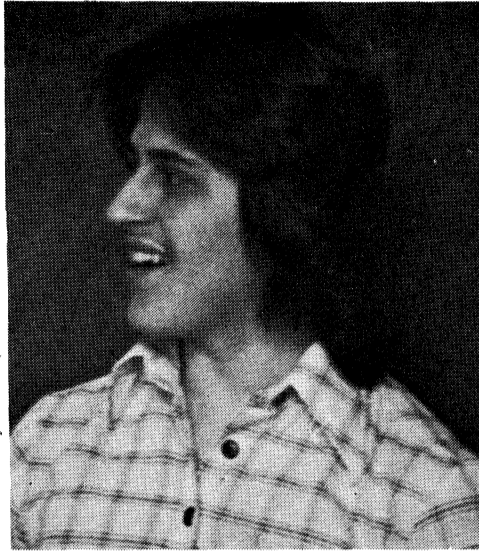
Don't wait for the other fellow to come to you: go to him.

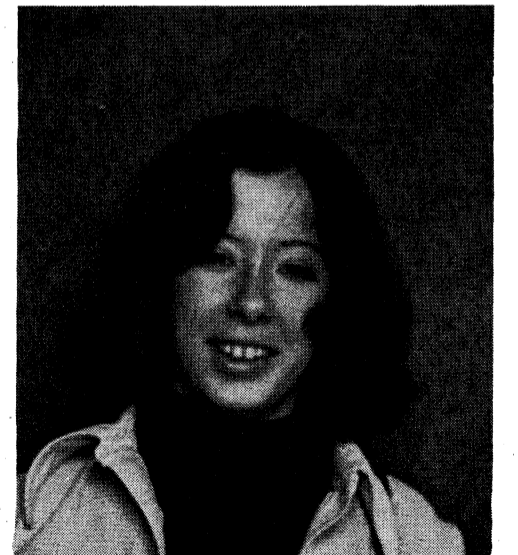

This past year at Glendon, the G.C.S.U. has been completely devoted to internal matters and the philosophy of bread and circuses. They have concentrated on Glendon as an island separate from the world at large. Unfortunately, we are members of a larger community. I am referring not only to the fact that financially we are tied to York University but that we are also completely vulnerable to the whims of the Conservative gov't of Ontario. The government this year has decided that there should be educational cutbacks. ATHLETIQUES REPRESENTANTS

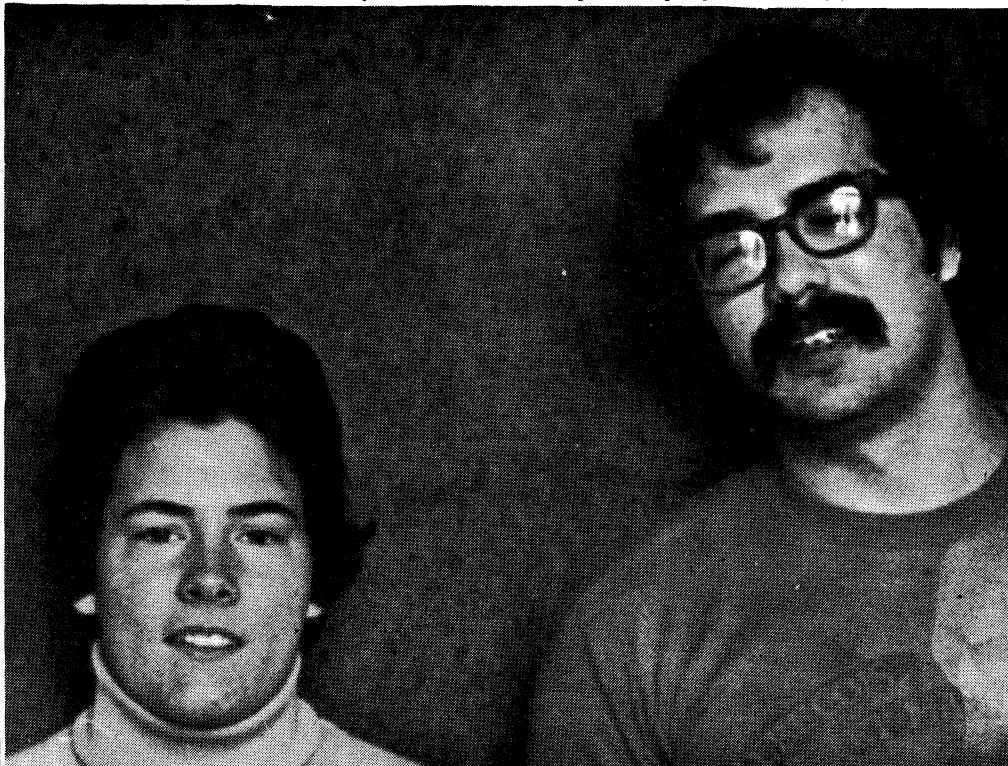

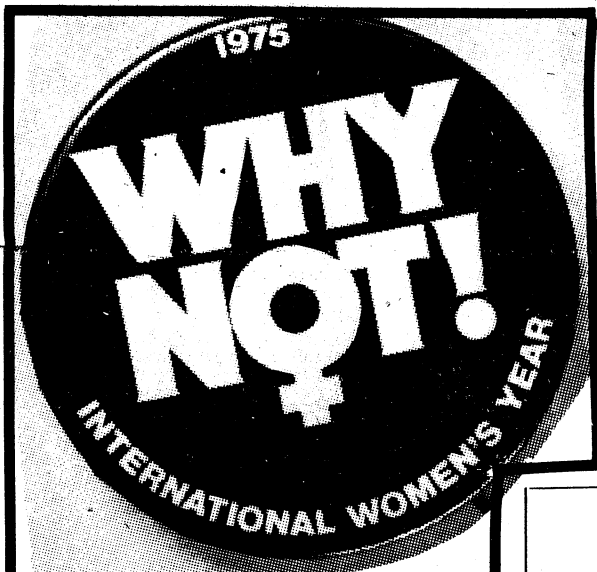

After thirteen but less than fourteen weeks of fighting that never-ending battle against my weekly deadline, I have finally learned the

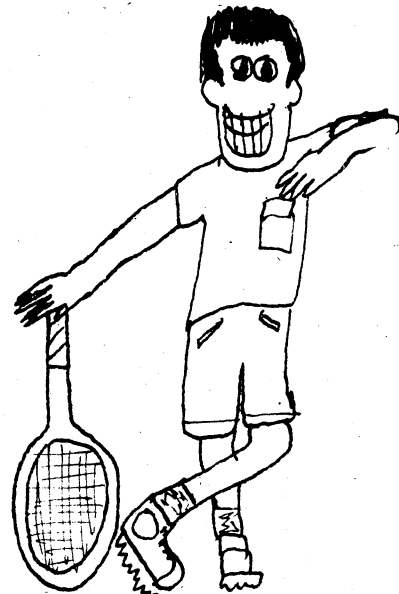
