

Peaceful alternatives

In cooperation with CUEW local 3, the *Glendon Anti-War Coalition* sponsored its first teach-in last Thursday in Room 204, as part of an ongoing effort to present peaceful alternatives to the violent and senseless attempts at conflict resolution currently underway in the Persian Gulf.

Les principaux lecteurs étaient Prof. Lorraine Gauthier (Etudes de la condition féminine, Glendon), Prof. Gabriel Kolko (Science Politique, Arts, campus Keele), Prof. Reg Whitaker (Histoire, Arts, campus Keele) et Prof. Jan Newson (Sociologie, Arts, campus Keele).

Professor Gauthier spoke on the Gulf War as being yet another example of masculine violence perpetrated on a huge scale, but being essentially no different in principle from the campaign of terror and violence waged daily against women around the world by the patriarchal structure of our society.

Professor Kolko a parlé de

la politique étrangère des Etats-Unis dans le Golfe. Il a démontré la différence entre le discours officiel justifiant la guerre et les intérêts politiques. Il a encouragé les étudiant(e)s à protester contre la guerre, à manifester, et à faire des pressions auprès du gouvernement en général. Le Professeur Whitaker a parlé du rôle du Canada dans le monde à la suite de la Guerre froide et a fait des comparaisons entre la guerre du Golfe et la guerre de Corée dans les années cinquante, soulevant l'emprise de la politique militaire américaine sur celle du Canada.

Professor Jan Newson closed the panel discussion with a more personal discussion of the effects of foreign wars on the populace at home, how racism is being sparked, perhaps not accidentally, by the media, and how it ends in situations like in England where Palestinians and citizens of Palestinian descent are being detained without trial or right to legal counsel in the interests of "national security".

Discontentment in Wood Residence

The air was thick, and drafts blew through the room. A mousetrap sat in the corner. Holes and burns decorated the carpet. The students were angry.

No, this is not a scene from a horror movie. It was the C-House common room on Wednesday, January 30... and a meeting with Leon Wasser in Wood Residence.

There were a great number of concerns expressed about Business Operations on the Glendon Campus, particularly those concerning residence students. A number of individuals wanted to know why GST was being charged on pre-paid scrip meal plans. After a long, complicated explanation, it was ascertained that "junk" foods such as juices with less than 25% pure juice and individual packages of potato chips were indeed subject to the tax as they are not basic grocery items

and are in individual servings. The Business Office is attempting to avoid GST in the cafeteria meal plan purchases by ending the sales of GST applicable juices and possibly the introduction of bulk potato chips, which

will not be subject to GST.

Students were also concerned about the level of service from Wood Residence porter Debbe Manger. Some students thought she was performing well; however, the majority complained

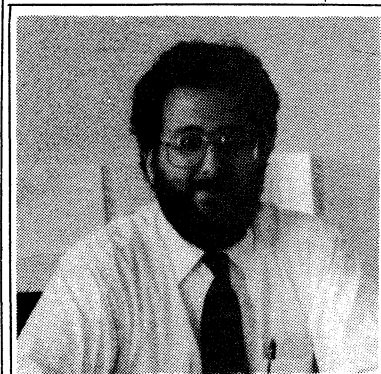
that she was frequently absent, unhelpful and inaccessible. Leon Wasser requested that students who perceived her service, or any other service, as poorly provided were to contact him or address Debbe Manger

with their dissatisfaction.

Maintenance was also a great concern. A mouse problem in C-House's second floor was discussed, and Wasser informed

Day student meal plan

Last week, on January 15, the Glendon College Food Services Committee and Administration agreed to introduce meal plans for non-residence students.

The Business Office revealed that the meal plan will be in the form of \$300 packages of scrip which can now be sold to any full-time students.

The memorandum by the Business Office also indicated

that the plan would be exempt from both PST and GST as it is for the residence students. However, residence students are not totally exempt, the tax applies to certain snack food items.

Interviewed on this matter, the Business Manager, Leon Wasser, said that the plan was established primarily for the students. "It is an opportunity for us to give the day or non-residence students the advan-

tage of reduced prices," he stated. In fact, the prices are not actually reduced, but some items are tax free.

Wasser also added that this plan means fewer taxes for Restauronics as well. Compared to the plan for residence students, this "new" plan does not include an automatic deduction for cafeteria maintenance as the original plan did in September.

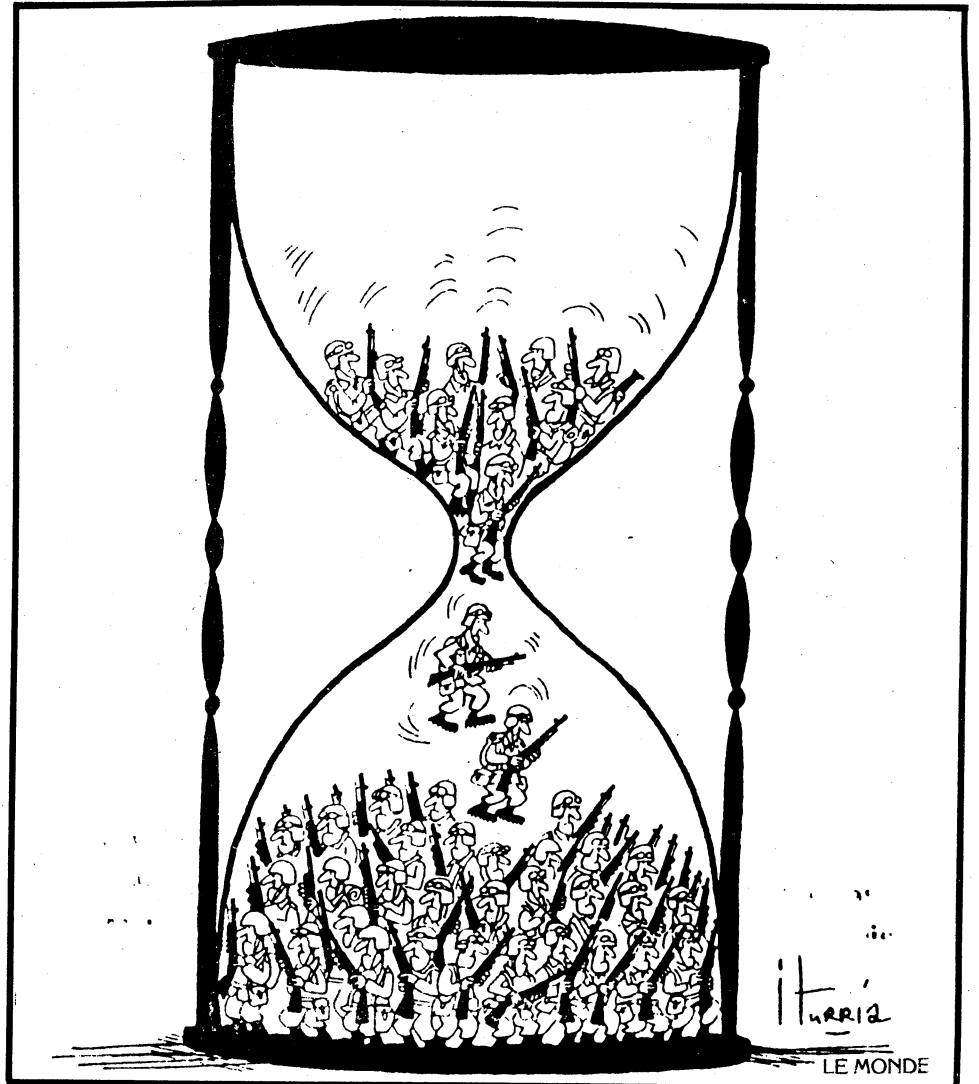

Going green

Although Glendon students are participating in the recycling program, it is beneficial to be refreshed on the "how-to's" and to learn about new student initiatives. This is the second in a series of articles on recycling in residence. The issue: aluminum and metal recycling.

Aluminum can recycling was initiated at Glendon last year. At present, residence garbage rooms are equipped with black barrels designated for "beverage cans only". For most people, using the barrels has become second nature. One reminder though - make sure your cans are empty! When the barrel is full, it is the responsibility of the house recycling representative to take the cans to the aluminum can recycling bin at the loading dock behind York Hall. This is where Alcan picks them up.

However, as students we use other recyclable metals besides aluminum cans. Metal food cans (soup, vegetables, etc.) metal lids and larger beverage cans, can also be recycled. Many houses have started their own "grass-roots" effort. In their garbage rooms they have designated a special container for metals. With the help of volunteer drivers, the recycling representative organizes a bi-monthly collection. These metals are taken to the recycling bin behind the Bayview and Eglinton Dominion. The rules are simple: rinse containers well and ensure that lids are placed inside the can. The labels can be left on. If your house isn't involved, offer to drive or set up the collection yourself!

Recycling is everyone's responsibility - this includes the Glendon community. Let's become a leader and make Glendon a friendlier place in the eyes of our environment.

versité York, depuis 1988 le promoteur a changé en grande partie ses plans du bâtiment.

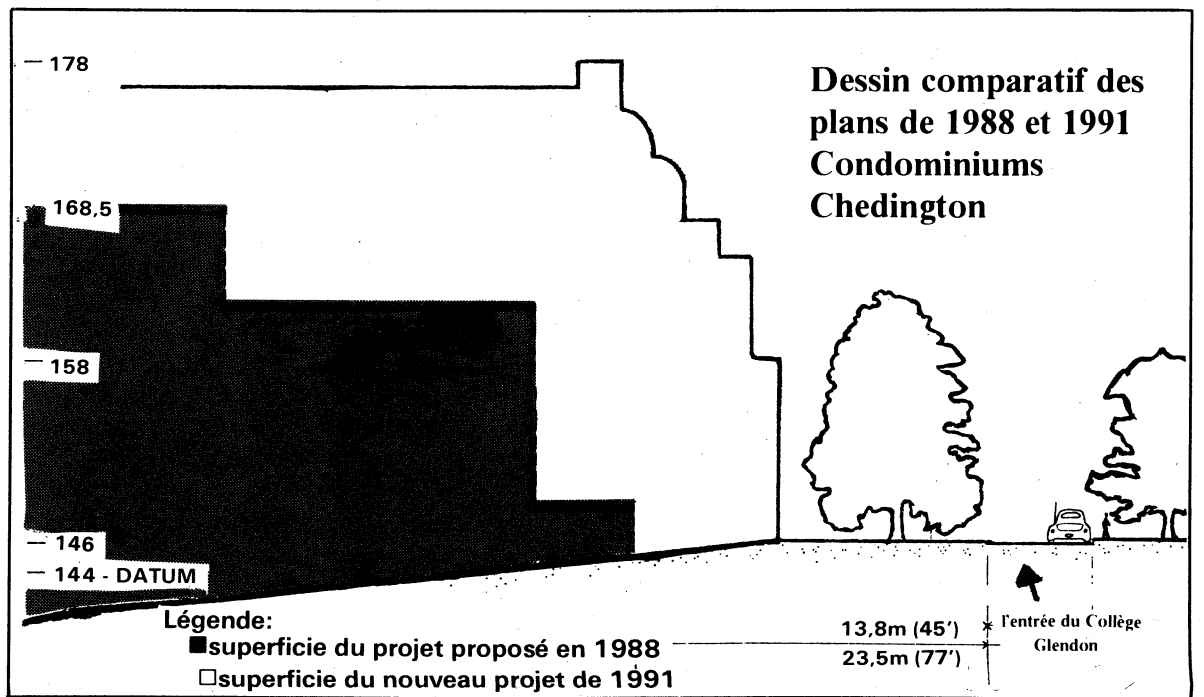
"If somebody applies for a building permit and they're within the allowable restrictions for that property, there is nothing I can do about it," said city councillor Joanne Flint.

"We don't need ten different groups going around telling us to lock our doors". Wrong! It is certain that we need to be told to lock our doors and take other safety precautions, because security risks still exist in our community.

Patricia Arnold and Trisha Yeo have spearheaded the effort to organize a Glendon Safety Awareness Night on Tuesday, February 5, from 5pm to 8pm, in the Salon Garigue. Last year's Security Awareness week was very successful, but there are still areas that need improvement. Improving personal safety, always and everywhere, as well as input from the Glendon community to enhance safety on campus are the main focus for this evening.

There will be a variety of speakers and topics covered

during the awareness night. A number of individuals participated in a METRAC (Metro Action Committee on Public Violence Against Women and Children) campus audit in December. These individuals will be leading half-hour dis-

cussions and demonstrations through parts of the campus. This portion of the evening promises to be both beneficial and eye-opening. As well, Shona Milligan and the Rape Crisis Centre will be in attendance to share their knowledge

and make suggestions for personal safety. The evening will conclude with a group discussion led by GWERC (Glendon Women's Education and Referral Centre), focusing on encouraging everyone to decide what defensive measure is most suitable for them.

This evening will not be an irrelevant night of repeated information. On the contrary, we must be aware of the statistics that inform us that 50% of all women will be victims of violence at some point in their lives. Although the evening is primarily geared to women, men are encouraged to participate. Everyone should bring a friend and take the first step in improving their safety habits, by attending Security Awareness Evening on February 5. Don't be a victim of unawareness!

 the students that regular pest control services are to begin on February 7. Drafts were also a concern, as were old, dirty carpets in rooms and common rooms. It was announced that the common room furniture would be steam-cleaned during this week, and that carpet replacement would continue each year (budget permitting). It was suggested that such measures as window caulking

and tape repairs might greatly reduce utility bills and save students' money for other repairs and renovations.

Cleanliness in bathrooms was one of the greatest problems for students. Reports of urine on toilet seats after cleaning had just been completed, dirty floors, unclean tubs and showers, and dead bugs in the washrooms. Most disturbing were the reports of cleaners using the same utensils to clean

tubs, sinks and toilets, and a certain "morceau de merde" that was stuck on a washroom wall for months until it fell off on its own.

The general consensus after all the complaints were made was that students were definitely not getting their money's worth for the services being provided. They were all tired of getting "screwed", and were irate at the projected increase from \$2460 to \$2619 for a single room next

year. Most importantly, students expressed not only discontent, but determination to work for change. They are not prepared to be quiet about poor services and broken promises for improvements, and they need each student to speak out against the administration. Act now for change - unless you want to sleep with a mouse for over \$300 per month!

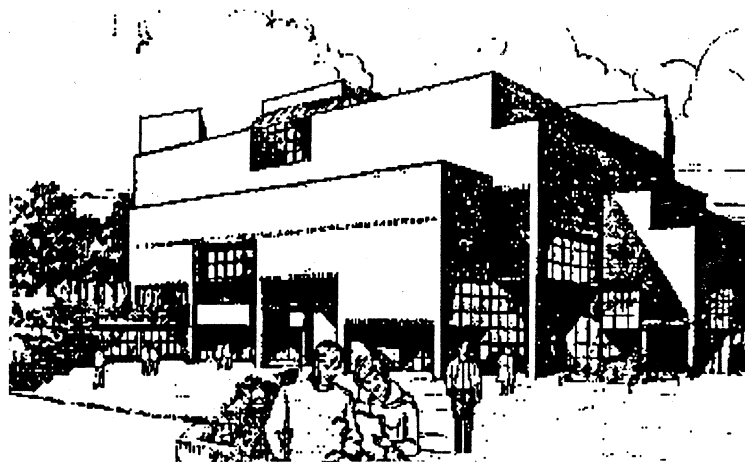

Glendon's abroad programme

This is a letter from 1989-90 News Editor Heather Scoffield. She is a third year Glendon student who is a participant in the "Study Abroad Programme." Ms Scoffield is studying at l'Université de Montréal and has sent us some feedback regarding this programme.

Despite its misleading name, Glendon's "Third Year Abroad Programme" is definitely worth taking advantage of. The programme allows Glendon students with proficiency in French to study in a francophone university, abroad or in Quebec, for their third year of a four-year degree.

With the help of Rosanna Furgiuele, who chairs the programme, Glendon has arranged to accept credits from students who follow courses in certain francophone universities in France, Belgium, and also

Quebec. The experience allows Glendon students to improve their French-language capabilities and to become acquainted with a different environment.

Although most students in the programme opt to go to Europe, the distance, a different educational system, and the customs have proven to cause difficulties in adapting and in finding course equivalents. Quebec, on the other hand, offers francophone universities of high calibre without the added problem of crossing

international borders, although some bureaucracy exists there as well.

My own experience at the Université de Montréal has exposed me to different points of view, especially regarding Canadian politics and culture. Montreal, with four universities, has endless research material in both French and English.

Immersion in a different language and culture is never without its problems, but Montreal has the facilities to make it relatively easy. Rent is cheap, tuition is low, enter-

tainment is endless, and in the case of homesickness, it's only 16¢ a minute to call Toronto after 11pm.

From an immersion point of view, the danger that exists in this bilingual city is that an anglophone can speak English during the time spent outside of class. A determination to speak French as much as possible is all that is needed, however, and the bilingualism is good training to help you switch quickly from one language to another.

Students interested in the Third-Year Abroad Programme may indeed be attracted by the exoticism of going "abroad". They should remember that the Province of Quebec can offer an immersion of equal quality, as well as an opportunity to become more familiar with our own Canadian political and cultural dilemma. Details of the programme are available from Professor Furgivele, Département d'études françaises.

The Glendon Food Service Committee would like to welcome all of the students for the Winter-Summer program at Glendon. This year should prove to be a very interesting one.

The GFSC would also like to introduce everyone to the new and improved \$300 scrip meal plan for day students. This scrip plan will give non-resident students the opportunity to purchase scrip for the food facilities at Glendon, which also gives the opportunity to be exempt from the provincial sales tax and the GST, the latter being imposed on all cash sales.

The GST is a new introduction brought to our food services by the friendly people of the Conservative government of Ottawa. The GST has been implemented on all cash sales in both the Restauronics facilities and the Café de la Terrasse. The tax has been exempted from most items in the Caf and the Bistro that are standard food items; but they seem to have shifted the concept of standard food items. (Just when you thought the food plan would exempt you from all taxes, they still found a way to get what they want.) Items that are not GST exempt are items such as, pop, chocolate milk, chips and ice cream. Why these are still taxable is a mystery to us.

The latest brainstorm by the GFSC is to acquire small penny bowls beside the cash registers in both the cafeteria and L'Arcade. If you have extra pennies that you don't particularly want, throw them in and the next time you don't have the penny, you can take one out. This is an honours system so let's not abuse it.

We welcome, once again, the newest members of the Glendon community and remind our old ones, if you have any concerns that you want to bring to the Committee's attention, please feel free to attend the next meeting on Tuesday, February 12, 1991, in the cafeteria at 5pm, and if there is anything too pressing to wait, don't feel why about approaching Lou or Don and they will be ready, willing and able to help you.

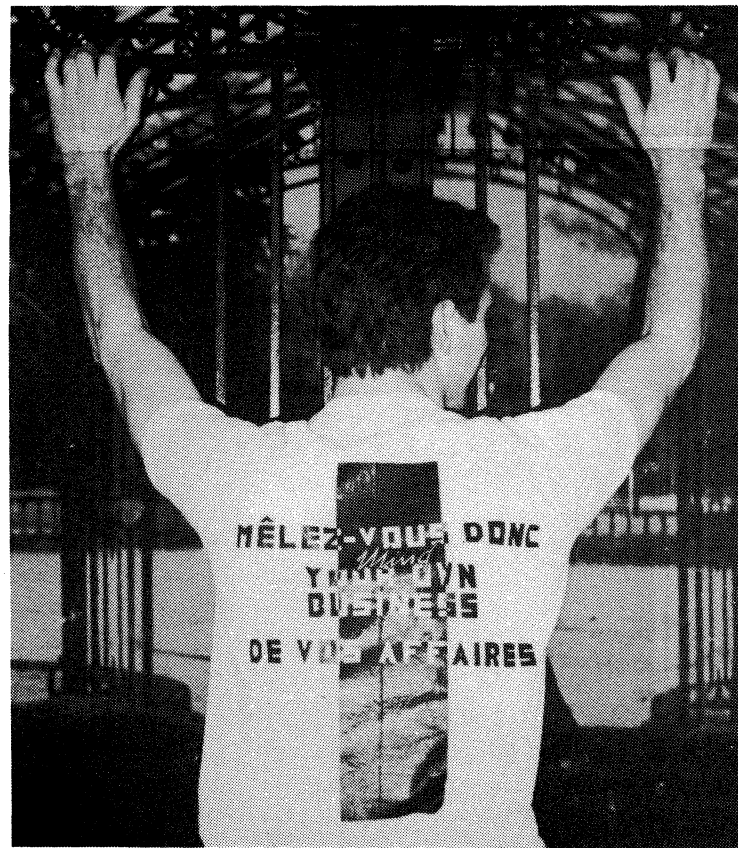

Programmes des moniteurs* de langues officielles

Le ministère de l'Éducation en liaison avec le Conseil des ministres de l'Éducation (Canada), dans le cadre d'un programme financé par le Secrétariat d'État du Canada, invite les étudiants à poser leur candidature pour devenir moniteurs de langue seconde (français ou anglais) pendant l'année scolaire 1991-1992.

Moniteurs à temps partiel

Les moniteurs de langue seconde doivent étudier à temps plein au niveau postsecondaire généralement hors de leur province d'origine. Ils travailleront de six à huit heures par semaine sous la supervision d'un enseignant de langue seconde. Un certain nombre de moniteurs francophones exerceront leurs fonctions dans les écoles françaises en milieu minoritaire. Ce programme de huit mois leur permet de gagner au moins 3 500\$, plus un voyage aller-retour entre la province d'accueil et leur domicile. Les étudiants admissibles sont ceux qui ont terminé ou qui termineront à la fin de l'année scolaire 1990-1991 une année d'études postsecondaires.

Moniteurs à temps plein

Les moniteurs à temps plein doivent avoir terminé une année d'études postsecondaires. Les moniteurs travaillent 25 heures par semaine sous la supervision d'enseignants de langue seconde ou d'enseignants d'un module scolaire de langue française, en milieu rural ou mi-urbain, généralement à l'extérieur de leur province d'origine. Les moniteurs reçoivent jusqu'à 10 000\$ pour 10 mois de participation. On leur paie aussi deux voyages aller-retour par année entre leur province de domicile et la province d'accueil, et ils peuvent recevoir une prime d'installation d'un maximum de 770\$ et une allocation de déplacement au sein de la province d'accueil d'un maximum de 1 110\$.

Saddam est-il un fidèle?

Aux yeux de Saddam Hussein, Satan rime avec Occident et nous sommes tous des Infidèles. Ce terme a une double connotation : sont infidèles, non seulement les Occidentaux, mais aussi, plus largement, tous ceux qui sont "contre" lui (Egypte, Maroc, Arabie Saoudite...)

Sur quoi Saddam fonde-t-il sa politique? Saddam Hussein est un amateur d'histoire. Pour lui, l'Etat d'Israël n'a aucune existence légitime.

Peut-être désire-t-il libérer les lieux saints de toute présence infidèle? Les croisades reprennent donc, mais la "Guerre Sainte" est désormais entreprise du côté arabe. Pour anecdote, on peut rappeler que les premières croisades se sont déroulées au XIIIe et XIVe siècles de l'ère chrétienne et que l'entreprise irakienne a débuté au XIVe siècle de l'ère musulmane. L'histoire se répéterait-elle?

Le passé s'avère donc omniprésent. Ce n'est pas un hasard si Saddam Hussein en appelle aujourd'hui aux héros mythi-

ques du passé. Nabuchodonosor (605-562 av. J.C.) a constamment visé à évincer l'Egypte de la Palestine et de la Syrie. C'était un "grand guerrier". Pour nombre d'Irakiens, il incarne l'un des grands personnages symboliques de l'histoire. Le but de Saddam Hussein est d'être désormais perçu par les Arabes comme l'un de ces héros historiques. Il souhaite redonner prestige et prospérité au Moyen-Orient qui - sans le

Has Canada rejected Quebec?

The current line in Quebec is: "Canada has rejected Quebec." Politicians there find it necessary to hiccup this phrase from time to time in order to appeal to an increasingly powerful separatist sentiment. Unfortunately, instead of maintaining support for the Liberals as hoped, this new tactic has had the exact opposite effect and strengthened support for the

Parti-Québécois. Liberals would be well-advised to downplay the notion that Canada has rejected Quebec as this only decreases their popularity in the polls.

Besides, it isn't even true. Whenever English Canada has rejected something, they have rejected something they didn't understand, such as the Meech Lake Accord. English Canada didn't understand it, and so they had no choice but to reject

it as unjustifiable, greed-inspired gold-digging. No one knew why it was so important for Quebec.

It is certainly understandable why people in Quebec would assume that Canada's distaste for Meech Lake could be equated with a rejection of Quebec. (Certainly, having that idea pounded into our minds repeatedly counts for something.) But it is very naïve and shallow to conclude that the rest of Canada is "hostile" towards Quebecers just because they are from Quebec. This assumption amounts to propaganda and is simply a lie. This type of open racism is not generally apparent these days and to suggest that it could be found to such a vast extent is outlandish.

English Canadians are a reasonable people. And so I

say to Quebec, "Talk to us! Reason with us! Make your case!" Of course people will say no to giving away power if it is simply demanded without explanation. People don't understand why Quebec wants what it wants. People outside Quebec will accept that Quebec has special needs due to cultural and geographical differences. It just has to be explained.

People all over Canada are afraid of being tricked again. Since the Mulroney government's misadventures, we have all become mistrustful. We have taken to blurting a somewhat automatic and mindless "No!" when anyone asks us for anything. This is true for Quebecers, too, and all of us should take this into consideration before deciding not to make concessions.

Elektra: Freudian concept

It is very rare that an opera that is two solid hours in length is able to completely capture the audience's attention. But such was the case with the Canadian Opera Company's production of **Elektra** (which is playing until February 9).

As soon as the curtain is raised, one cannot help but sit and observe. The scenery is

phenomenal - the setting of the piece was presented as if in a prehistoric, dark time in ancient Egypt.

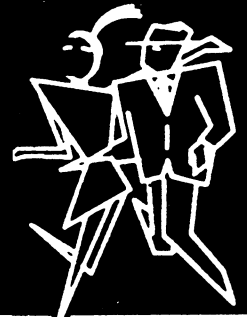
But an opera is not merely scenery. Soprano Johanna Meier not only reached the heights of acoustics with her voice, she also reached the heights of each emotion of Elektra. Her voice was so passionate with the song of the wrongdoings of Klytamnestra

that it nearly caused the audience to fall into the Freudian complex named after her. (Of course, this would have been in regards to Elektra's mother...)

The scene of emotional climax in this presentation came when Orest (performed by bass-baritone Tom Fox) surprises his sister Elektra by returning home to avenge his father's murder. Fox's smooth yet powerful voice caused me to practically "melt". I have never heard an opera singer's voice that contained such a pure quality, and by pure I mean faultless. His voice drifted over the audience in the same way as Orest's arrival impresses Elektra - in a calm, reassuring, yet strong tone.

The only qualm I had with this near-perfect performance was the *choreography* (or lack thereof) of Elektra's dance of passion. Instead of dancing with enough ecstasy and fervour to cause death, as is supposed to be done according to the story of Elektra, this dance (in the production) could not even be considered a dance, as it looked more like the footwork of a Neanderthal who is trying to balance a slab of marble. But then, nobody ever asked opera singers if they could dance...
